LCCI CHIEF CALLS FOR WITHDRAWAL OF NEW FLASH POINT STANDARDS FOR 40 IMPORTED CHEMICALS

LAHORE: - The Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry has raised serious concerns regarding recent regulatory changes in Pakistan's flash point standards for imported chemicals regarding import, transportation and storage which is hitting 40 chemicals including Prop BH, Isobutanol - IBA, Styrene Monomer, Gum Turpentine, N Butanol - Normal Butyl Alcohol, Butyl Acrylate, Acetic Acid and others.

The Minister for Petroleum should convene an urgent meeting of the stakeholders to have their feedback on this serious issue which is hitting pharmaceutical, printing, adhesive and various other industries. In a letter to the Minister for Energy (Petroleum Division) Musadik Masood Malik, LCCI President Mian Abuzar Shad said that the new standards were imposed without prior consultation with the business community, potentially endangering thousands of industries that rely on these chemicals as essential raw materials. The LCCI President said that the decision has been implemented immediately while DPL License application process, can take up to two years to complete. The industry could not survive for such a long time without necessary chemchemical. He said that this delay, along with additional demurrage and detention fees that accrue after 24 hours of port holding time has led to significant financial strain for the business community.
